A Message From One Of Our Elders Bill Jones

The Reality of Uncertainty and Illusion of Control

A newborn baby cries out trying to get someone or something to make him comfortable and calm his fears. He begins life seeking to control his environment. This desire to have control over our life circumstances doesn't end when we are babies. It progresses into childhood, the teen years, and into adulthood only ending when we breathe our last. However, no matter how hard we try, this life is full of uncertainties, and our ability to control life's circumstances is, at best, limited.

I came across an article by Chris Elkins that really resonated with me in light of the COVID19 pandemic:

"The reality of uncertainty and the absence of control are the most distressing things I am experiencing in all of this. There's no certainty about how this virus will spread or who it will impact. The economic uncertainty is palpable. As well, I have zero control of the stock market, the hoarding, or people's compliance to guidelines. I find all of this troubling and deeply distressing.

Coronavirus did not create this reality—it just made it clear. To this point, I have mistakenly confused a measure of material success with the myth of certainty. Nothing in this world is certain, no matter the balance in my checking account or the investments in my retirement plan. Control is an illusion. I often cannot even control myself, much less anything outside of me.

The myth of certainty and the illusion of control are the result of the devil's oldest temptation: being like God. God's Word is all I have that is certain. (Emphases added)

This article made me think of Job who, in the beginning of his story, seemingly had his wealth and family firmly under his control. That all changed quickly due to forces unknown to him. However, through all of this "Job did not sin or charge God with wrong" (Job 1:22). Job's story ended well, not because he was in control, but because of his faith and trust in an all-powerful God who IS in control.

Be encouraged. We have certainty in our Father's promise to supply our every need (Philippians 4:19), that all things will work together for our good (Romans 8:28), and that because of Jesus Christ our Savior, we have victory over death (1 Corinthians 15:57).
